


Lincoln Park Strategic Goal: Community Capacity

June 2018

Please note that the Common Good Initiative in Lincoln Park has identified multiple priorities and goals that work together to achieve change. This document provides information on investments and results for one of those priorities.

What have we invested in this goal to date?



Examples of investments include:

- Funding for the Lincoln Park Advisory Committee to create a resource guide for Lincoln Park residents.
- Capacity building for five Lincoln Park community-based organizations. This includes an assessment, training, customized technical assistance, and completion of an action plan to improve capacity.
- The Fellowship for the Common Good, a cross-community resident leadership development program.
- To provide two full-time volunteers. One volunteer will organize outreach and community involvement in Lincoln Park for Florida Rural Legal Services; the other will act as a Crime Prevention Liaison for the Fort Pierce Police Department.

What are the results?

The number of partnerships leveraged	1 partnership The City of Fort Pierce will support the Lincoln Park Capacity Building Project by providing grants to nonprofits that have successfully completed the program.

These results reflect investments made to build community capacity. Investments in other community priorities may also increase community capacity. For example, the collaborative grant to address infant mortality is leveraging partnerships but is not reflected here.

What are the highlights?

One interviewee noted the importance of this strategy: “I think the good work we do with the organizations, grassroots organizations, helping them to become more sustainable, is a good idea as well because once Allegany leaves and stop funding, you're going to need some institutions within the community to keep the work going.”

Lincoln Park Community Priority: Safe and healthy neighborhoods

What have we invested in this priority to date?



Grants and grant-related investments	\$871,950

Examples of investments include:

- Support for street outreach worker positions for the Gang Initiative.
- A youth summit and matching grants to nine organizations for summer youth programming in the Lincoln Park community.
- Funding to decrease crime, improve community relationships, and increase Fort Pierce Police Department transparency, through equipment, technology, and community relations efforts.
- A project to decrease infant deaths by hiring a registered nurse to assess, monitor, and improve the service system for women and infants.
- Training, technical assistance, and capital to increase healthy food offerings in local stores.

What are the results for this six-month period?

What are the highlights for this six-month period?


- Over six grocery aisles were cleaned, reset and re-merchandised. The project took place over two nights after the closing of the store and included five Hebni team members, ten youth from the Lincoln Park neighborhood, and two store members. Food demonstrations have begun at the United Against Poverty Center. The reception while slow at first has gained in popularity and have had up to 10 people participated in the sessions.
- The Lincoln Park Fetal and Infant Mortality review has formed a collaborative Case Review Team with 25 members. After data analysis was completed, the team presented thier recommendations to reduce gaps to the Roundtable of Saint Lucie meeting. Roundtable members asked that action plans be generated to address the recommendations and then be brought to the Roundtable.

Lincoln Park Community priority: Quality jobs and livable wages

What have we invested in this priority to date?



Examples of investments include:

- An impact fund to sponsor a job fair in the Lincoln Park community with employers in the manufacturing industry.
- Funding to help cover the salary and fringe benefits for a new City staff position - the Lincoln Park Revitalization Coordinator.
- Funding for a marketing campaign to encourage Lincoln Park residents to engage with job-related services.
- Funding to create a community-based app where residents will become more aware of services that can help them with jobs and job training.

What are the highlights?

- The VP met with St. Lucie County Commissioners and a CareerSource representative because funding had expired for a youth summer employment. The group discussed the program impact and the Common Good Initiative's role. The County BOCC added line item for funding 2019.
- The Revitalization Coordinator has completed initial tasks: she created an inventory of all home-based and commercial businesses within the Lincoln Park area.
