


# Lincoln Park Community priority: Quality jobs and livable wages

November 2018

Please note that the Common Good Initiative in Lincoln Park has identified multiple priorities and goals that work together to achieve change. This document provides information on investments and results for one of those priorities.

## What have we invested in this priority to date?



Examples of investments include:

- Funding to help cover the salary and fringe benefits for a new City staff position - the Lincoln Park Revitalization Coordinator.
- Funding for a marketing campaign to encourage Lincoln Park residents to engage with job-related services.
- Funding to create a community-based app where residents will become more aware of health and human services offerings, employment and community events.
- An investment to provide Lincoln Park residents the opportunity to participate in a job training certification and placement program, including support to eliminate barriers to participate.

## What are the results?

Increased number of residents attending job training	No data at this time; grant award occurred in the last four months.
Increased number of Lincoln Park residents employed	No data at this time; grant award occurred in the last four months.
Increased number of small businesses in Lincoln Park	No data at this time although progress has been made (creating an inventory, a grant program, and the Expo).

## What are the highlights?


- 300 people attended the first annual Lincoln Park Business Expo. Business from the Lincoln Park district participated for free and promoted their goods and services. Attendees participated in Life and Business Coaching sessions as well as seminars in a conference-style event. Over 25 Lincoln Park businesses and/or potential new start-ups learned about business 101, City departments and permitting, business sustainability and marketing. Partners included Indian River State College, the Small Business Development Center, and SCORE.
- The City of Fort Pierce will soon open grant opportunities to improve the facade of commercial buildings with occupancy along the Avenue D corridor and to assist new and relocating small businesses to the Avenue D corridor.

# Lincoln Park Strategic Goal: Community Capacity

## What have we invested in this goal to date?



### Examples of investments include:

- Capacity building for ten Lincoln Park community-based organizations. This includes an assessment, training, customized technical assistance, and completion of an action plan to improve capacity.
- The Fellowship for the Common Good, a cross-community resident leadership development program.
- To provide two full-time volunteers. One volunteer will organize outreach and community involvement in Lincoln Park for Florida Rural Legal Services; the other will act as a Crime Prevention Liaison for the Fort Pierce Police Department.

Resident leaders increase leadership knowledge and skills	91% of fellows reported taking action to advance their communities whether that was getting more engaged with existing organizations or taking on a larger project.
Increase the number of resident leaders	9 residents from Lincoln Park participated/are participating in the Fellowship for the Common Good
The number of partnerships leveraged	<p>1 partnership</p> <p>The City of Fort Pierce will support the Lincoln Park Capacity Building Project by providing grants to nonprofits that have successfully completed the program.</p>

These results reflect investments made to build community capacity. Investments in other community priorities may also increase community capacity. For example, the collaborative grant to address infant mortality is leveraging partnerships but is not reflected here and the Expo increased business owner capacity but is reflected under another priority.

## What are the highlights?


- 95 participants participated in six capacity building workshops: 97% reported increased knowledge as a result of the workshop. Evaluations conducted post-workshop (up to six months later) documented that organizations are applying knowledge.

# Lincoln Park Community Priority: Safe and healthy neighborhoods

## What have we invested in this priority to date?



Examples of investments include:

- Support for street outreach worker positions for the Gang Initiative.
- Funding to decrease crime, improve community relationships, and increase Fort Pierce Police Department transparency, through equipment, technology, and community relations efforts.
- A project to decrease infant deaths by hiring a registered nurse to assess, monitor, and improve the service system for women and infants.
- Training, technical assistance, and capital to increase healthy food offerings in local stores.

## What are the results?

The table below provides results through October 31, 2018. These results pertain only to relevant outcomes for grants assigned to this priority, there may be outcomes related to these grants that are reported under other priorities.

<b>Desired results per the strategic plan</b>	<b>Results for January - October 2018</b>
Increase healthy food offerings in local stores	1 store has increased healthy food offerings
Decreased gang-related incidents	21% decrease in youth served by the gang initiative that offended
Improved resident and police relationships	Second annual Unity in the Community event held
Reduced gaps in infant mortality system and decreased infant mortality	2 new collaborative programs implemented as a result of FIMR recommendations

## What are the highlights for this six-month period?

- As the Unity in the Community event has grown, FPPD is exploring a number of options to sustain the event.
- All recommendations generated by the FIMR process will be addressed and implemented by the Community Action Team (CAT) and/or on a one-on-one basis with the relevant organization. The CAT will now be part of the Infant Mortality Workgroup.
