


# Lincoln Park Strategic Goal: Community Capacity

November 2019

Please note that the Common Good Initiative in Lincoln Park has identified multiple priorities and goals that work together to achieve change. This document provides information on investments and results for one of those priorities.

## What have we invested in this goal to date?



### Examples of investments include:

- Capacity building for 10 Lincoln Park community-based organizations.
- The Fellowship for the Common Good, a leadership development program.
- Supporting two full-time volunteers. One volunteer will organize outreach and community involvement in Lincoln Park for Florida Rural Legal Services; the other will act as a Crime Prevention Liaison for the Fort Pierce Police Department.
- Providing wireless connectivity to create a Smart Neighborhood to benefit residents and allow for recruitment of additional business.

## What are the highlights?


- The City Commission approved the first step in Lincoln Park Young Professionals acquiring land for their BOOM project.

# Lincoln Park Community Priority: Safe and healthy neighborhoods

## What have we invested in this priority to date?



<b>Grants and grant-related investments</b>	\$1,216,450
<b>Impact funds</b>	\$109,051
<b>TOTAL</b>	<b>\$1,325,501</b>

### Examples of investments include:

- Support for street outreach worker positions for the Gang Initiative.
- Funding to decrease crime, improve community relationships, and increase Fort Pierce Police Department transparency, through equipment, technology, and community relations efforts.
- A project to decrease infant deaths by hiring a registered nurse to assess, monitor, and improve the service system for women and infants.
- Training, technical assistance, and capital to increase healthy food offerings in local stores.

Increase healthy food offerings in local stores	1 store has increased healthy food offerings
Decreased gang-related incidents	32% decrease in violent crimes  87% of the 87 youth served in the gang prevention initiative gained employment
Improved resident and police relationships	Second annual Unity in the Community event held
Reduced gaps in infant mortality system and decreased infant mortality	2 new collaborative programs implemented as a result of FIMR recommendations  \$200,000 in funding committed by a local funder

## What are the highlights for this six-month period?


- On October 18, the Lincoln Park Council for the Common Good in partnership with Hebni Nutrition Consultants convened community stakeholders to learn about the Lincoln Park Food Security Assessment. This convening focused on the following: food security assessment outcomes, challenges and lessons learned, and recommendations and solutions
- Although results cannot be attributed solely to the Infant Mortality initiative, black infant deaths in St. Lucie County have decreased.

# Lincoln Park Community priority: Quality jobs and livable wages

## What have we invested in this priority to date?



<b>Grants and grant-related investments</b>	\$905,000
<b>Impact funds</b>	\$27,500
<b>TOTAL</b>	<b>\$932,500</b>

Examples of investments include:

- Funding to help cover the salary and fringe benefits for a new City staff position - the Lincoln Park Revitalization Coordinator.
- An investment to provide Lincoln Park residents the opportunity to participate in a job training certification and placement program, including support to eliminate barriers to participate.
- Funding so that Lincoln Park youth can have summer jobs to earn money and be exposed to real world, on the job training.
- An investment to support small business start-up and relocation in Lincoln Park.

## What are the results?

The table below provides results through October 31, 2019. These results pertain only to relevant outcomes for grants assigned to this priority, there may be outcomes related to these grants that are reported under other priorities.

<b>Desired results per the strategic plan</b>	<b>Results for January 2018 – October 2019</b>
Increased number of residents attending job training	38 Career Pathways students have earned certifications for careers.  Of the 107 Summer of Success students 85% of participants showed an overall increase in work-readiness knowledge as measured by the Pre and Post-test assessments.
Increased number of Lincoln Park residents employed	29 Career Pathways students have been placed in jobs.  96% of Summer of Success students completed their internship.
Increased number of small businesses in Lincoln Park	Data are not yet due.

## What are the highlights?

- 15 employers hosted interns through the Summer of Success program.
- 1 businesses has been approved and 5 applications are pending for grants for startups or relocations to Avenue D; each could add up to two additional positions for Lincoln Park residents and the rehabilitation construction will create opportunities for local contractors.
- 18 Lincoln Park businesses attended the 3<sup>rd</sup> Treasure Coast Business Expo of which 11 were exhibitors.
