

Wimauma Access to Health¹

May 2020

What have we invested in Access to Health to date?

\$663,500: four grants and grant-related investments and nine impact funds. Examples of investments include:

- Provide funding for a part-time benefits coordinator to assist families in accessing public assistance resources.
- Bridge funding to continue the work of the Puentes de Salud (Bridges to Health) Project.
- Funds will support increased capacity for frontline staff at La Esperanza clinic. This will increase access to healthcare services for our migrant community and is paramount to creating a healthy Wimauma*.
- Capacity building grant to provide administrative, planning and direct services to support the only free clinic (La Esperanza) in the Wimauma community*.

*Although two separate investments, grantees worked in close collaboration to meet the goals of the project.

What are the results?

- 730 screenings were provided in the community. In addition, 108 persons took advantage of educational offerings. Other partners include Prevent Blindness and St. Joseph's Children's Hospital who provided services on open clinic nights.
- There were 108 participants in a total of 52 educational classes: 90% increased knowledge as shown on a posttest.
- Of 180 diabetic visits, 46% maintained a controlled blood sugar. Of 216 hypertensive visits, 63% maintained a BP under 139/89.
- In 2019 the clinic saw 871 patients, with 222 of those being new patients. In addition to primary care, the clinic significantly contributes to well woman care and diabetic and hypertension management. Patients reported 173 incidences of emergency room avoidance due to the care received at LEC.


¹ Access to Health was one of 10 potential priorities when the initiative began. Investments were made in FY15 while the top three community priorities were still being identified.

What have we invested in this goal to date?

Examples of investments include:

- Funding to provide the down payment for the purchase of building to be used as a community resource hub.
- Investment in, and development of, the anchor organization.
- The Fellowship for the Common Good, a cross-community resident leadership development program.
- Supporting four full-time volunteers to assist local organizations.
- Wimauma Now! Initiative to support community advocacy.
- Funding to support free Wifi access.

What are the results?

The table below provides results through April 30, 2002. These results pertain only to relevant outcomes for grants assigned to this priority, there may be outcomes related to these grants that are reported under other priorities.

Impact	Results for January 2018 – April 2020
Organizations have increased capacity	2 organizations have increased capacity: increased staff, expanded boards, new programming, and established procedures and systems.
More resident leaders	15 Fellows from Wimauma have participated/are participating in the Fellowship for the Common Good.
Resources brought into Wimauma	2 grant partners have obtained additional funding of almost \$2,000,000 (there is overlap with the economic opportunity priority).

These results reflect investments made to build community capacity. Investments in other community priorities and other Common Good Initiative activities also increase community capacity.

What are the highlights?


- The Wimauma NOW project's voice was recognized at a Hillsborough County Council meeting regarding a resolution to halt development in Wimauma.
- Wimauma Connects is providing free online access to more than twenty businesses and at least 25 homes in the area adjacent to the corridor. Through the network, the public can access free wi-fi within 500 feet of any participating establishments.

Wimauma Community Priority: Economic Opportunities

What have we invested in this priority to date?



Examples of investments include:

- Economic development infrastructure to support microenterprise and implement a resource center for low income women in Wimauma; this is a joint partnership with the Children’s Board of Hillsborough County.
- Support for the United Way Wimauma Family Resource Center. The Center provides an array of services to help individuals and families work towards long-term financial stability.

Please note that other investments that impact economic opportunity are included in the Community Capacity priority.

What are the highlights?


- Hillsborough Community College has committed to installing a third modular building for additional education and workforce training space.
- ELI has developed a business venture at the clubhouse of Bayou Pass Village, a nearly 300 new housing development project in Ruskin. The café will serve as a one-year incubator for ELI members to sell their products/services.

What have we invested in this priority to date?

Examples of investments include:

- Installation of covered shelters over the basketball courts at two elementary schools in Wimauma.
- Remove the barrier of transportation for children and adults to attend summer enrichment activities at Hillsborough Community College.
- Staff to support advocacy and policy options related to out of school time.
- The Career Academy at Lennard High School will introduce vocational training opportunities to youth in Wimauma.

What are the highlights?

- At the South Hillsborough Career Academy, the goal was that 25% of students in the Academy would be Wimauma seniors; over 35% of participants were from Wimauma.
